West Orange Trail Bridge Over Florida's Turnpike To Close for Reconstruction Through Summer 2023

Florida's Turnpike Enterprise is scheduled to close the West Orange Trail (WOT) bridge over Florida's Turnpike/State Road (SR) 91 in Orange County on August 11, 2022. This closure is necessary for the demolition and reconstruction of the bridge which is anticipated to reopen in approximately one year. During reconstruction, WOT traffic will be detoured to the new County Road (CR) 438/Oakland Avenue bridge (the CR 438 bridge is closed to vehicle traffic), as described below:

West Orange Trail bridge over Florida's Turnpike/SR 91

Long-term full bridge closure through Summer 2023.

Detour information:

- Eastbound West Orange Trail (WOT) traffic wishing to continue east will be directed to travel south on the temporary access trail to CR 438/Oakland Avenue, travel east on CR 438 in the pedestrian lanes of the new bridge to Hull Island Drive and travel north on Hull Island Drive to access the WOT.
- Westbound WOT traffic wishing to continue west will be directed to Hull Island Drive, travel south on Hull Island Drive to the CR 438/Oakland Avenue bridge, travel west on the CR 438 bridge to the temporary access trail and travel north on the temporary access road to access the WOT. (Detour map below.)

This work is part of the project widening Florida's Turnpike from two to four lanes in each direction, from Clermont/SR 50 to Minneola/Hancock Road in Orange and Lake counties. This project is anticipated to be completed by mid-2026.

Please note that this schedule may change due to inclement weather or unforeseen conditions.

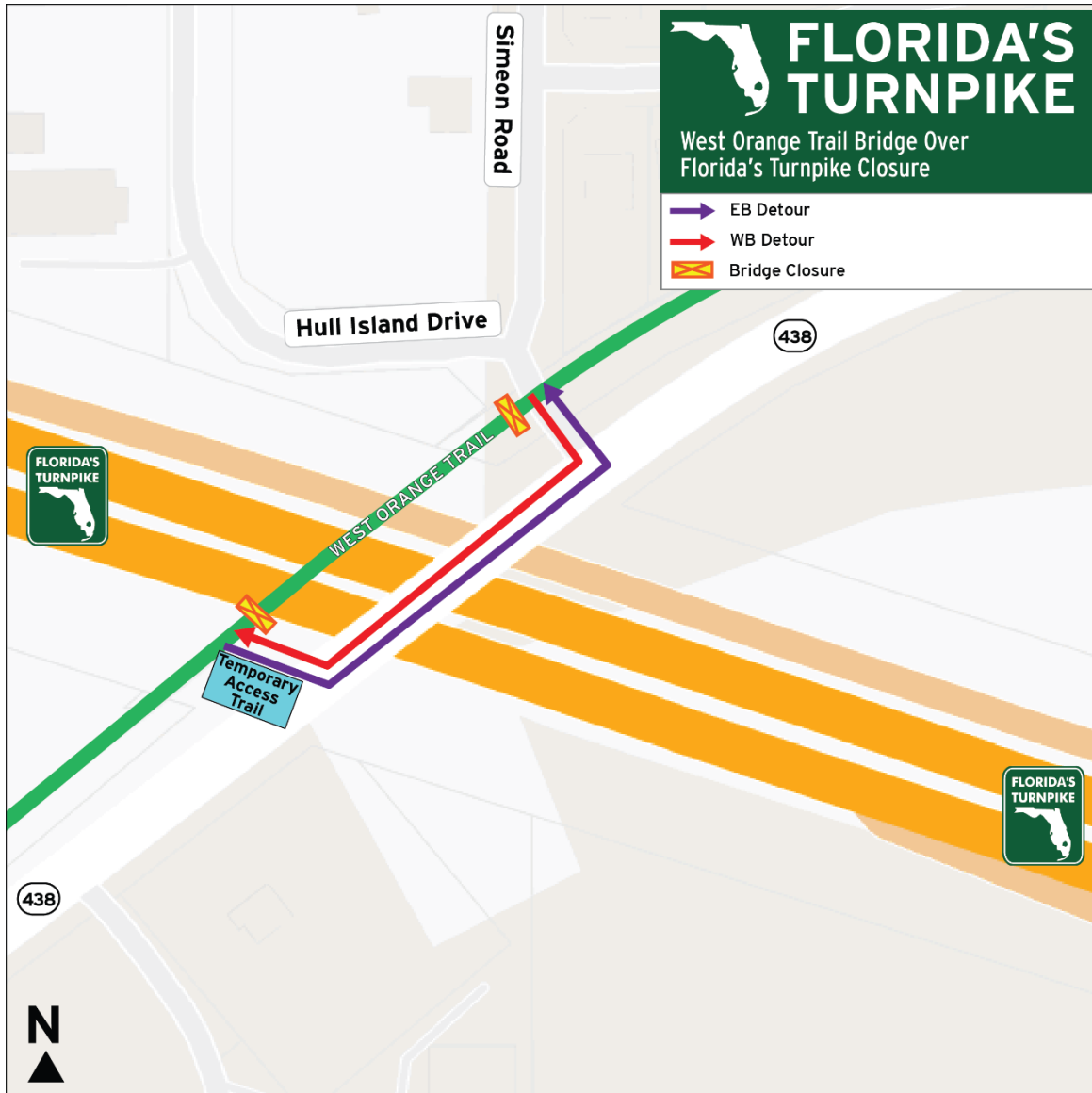
